Washington, DC – March 2009

Scenarios of the Future: HIM 2015

The delegates participated in analyzing four different scenarios regarding the possible futures of HIM and the organizational implication of such futures for the Association. What will it look like in 2015?

The scenarios bound the realm of future possibilities, are shaped by multiple forces, draw attention to a broad range of possibilities and help to monitor critical “weak signals” to the future.

When creating these scenarios, consideration was made to current and future trends, uncertainties, forces of change and rules of interaction/blueprints.

The following were key trends identified through interview and surveys:

1. (T) Unfunded mandates will continue to emerge from federal and state agencies further burdening the cost position of Health care providers
2. (T) Certification and degree programs are vital for the future development and relevance of the HIM profession
3. (T) Technologies that enable greater information management will be the key driver in the HIM practice and will fundamentally alter the makeup and practices of those employed today through automation, outsourcing and new priorities
4. (T) Educational demands on the HIM profession will increase as basic tasks are automated or outsourced or re-assigned to other depts.
5. (T) Regulatory requirements will increase drastically concerning issues of privacy and security of electronic documents
6. (T) Government, paying 50% of all bills will dictate reimbursement, pricing etc
7. (T) Changing healthcare delivery model – Transparency / Social Networking
8. (T) Assertive consumers will demand access and control over their own health records
9. (T) Self diagnosis, self medication and remote monitoring will shift the center of health care from the institution to the home
10. (T) Workforce shortages will be a major driver to HIM automation in the healthcare industry
11. (T) Hospitals will aim to increase efficiencies by outsourcing functional areas to service centers (e.g., HCA - coding and other HIM functions)

Do you agree with the above key trends? Are we already seeing some of these in our industry?

The following shows the top 10 uncertainties that were also identified thru interviews and surveys.

1. IT departments and other professionals will take over all of the essential functions of electronic health information management?

2. Within the next 5-7 years, standardization will be dictated by appropriate Federal agencies and enforced curtailing the decision authority of physicians, hospitals, states and other entities?
3. The HIM workforce will undergo a retirement exodus, taking with it invaluable experience?
4. Congress will legislate the mandatory provision of health care for all US citizens?
5. Self diagnosis, self medication and remote monitoring will shift the center of chronic disease management to the home?
6. Electronic health records will fail to deliver on the promise of cost saving, efficiency, interoperability and data analysis?
7. Changing forms of communication and a different workforce will pose a major challenge for the HIM practice?
8. Some basic activities will be automated and outsourced across the electronic health record industry?
9. In the near future coding and data collection will be replaced by data interpretation and information analysis?
10. The US will move towards a full coverage health care system that is accessible to all (basic-extended and comprehensive) over the next 5-7 years?

In creating the scenarios, the two most important uncertainties were selected. One uncertainty selected was the "State of Information Integration". Will it be incremental as in similar to today or will there be full integration within all of healthcare? The other uncertainty was "Healthcare Market Reform". Will it continue to be fragmented between government and business or will there be a fully coordinated approach?

Here are the resulting 4 scenarios:

Incremental information integration & Fragmented healthcare market reform = Groundhog Day. Same as today, not a whole lot of change

Incremental information integration & coordinated healthcare market reform = The Little Engine that Could. There are no more uninsured within the U.S. but the healthcare system is all over the place in terms of electronic HIM

Free market baby has integrated HIM throughout all of healthcare, but there is no coordination between the various players in the healthcare market

Nirvana in the future would be the Stairway to Heaven with a coordinated response to healthcare for the U.S. population and a fully integrated information system.

After considering the 4 futures, AHIMA then created this list of implications across all the scenarios.

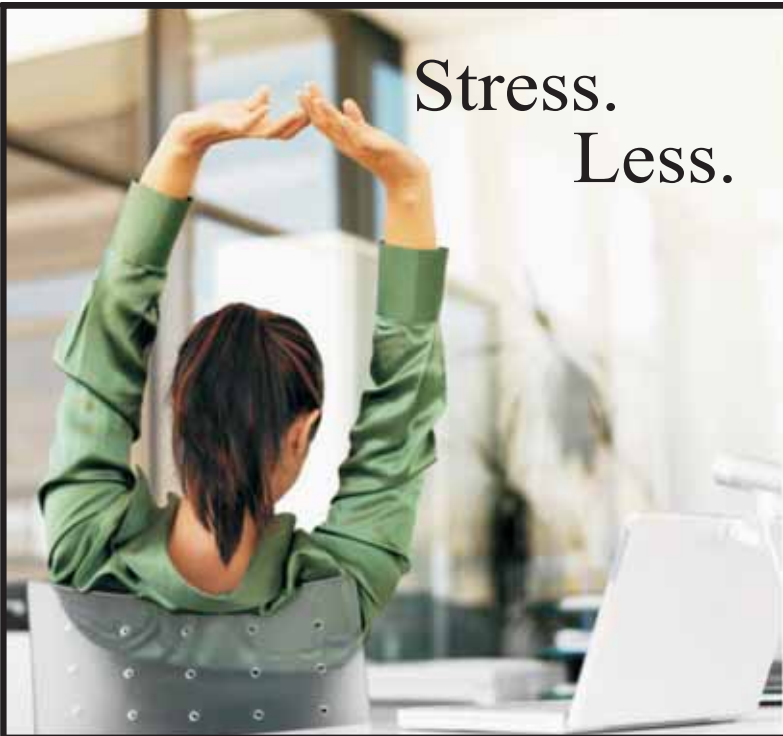
- Staying focused on a well-defined mission
- Agility / Flexibility (type of flexibility will differ by scenario)
- Collaboration – other associations and within wider healthcare field
- Research (how it's focused on differs by scenario) / Trusted knowledge resource
 - Evidenced-based HIM impacts and leading approaches
- Education/certification
 - Traditional and non-traditional
- Broad Service support for members
 - May be for-profit ventures (job banks?, etc.)

In summary, AHIMA is a strong, respected organization. However, AHIMA needs to be prepared to prosper in whatever future unfolds. The next steps are to review the critical core capabilities of the successful association of the future. Build on what works and will be required in the future, while proposing additions or changes to strengthen AHIMA's role within the HIM community and the broader healthcare system. It is not expected to look like any one scenario, but pieces of each scenario.

Watch for updates on the future direction our Association will take.

Effective April 1, 2009

CONSUMER PRICE INDEX INCREASE OF MEDICAL RECORDS ACCESS ACT FEES

Subsection 1 of Section 9 of Public Act 47 of 2004 (MCL § 333.26269), states the following:

(1) Except as otherwise provided in this section, if a patient or his or her authorized representative makes a request for a copy of all or part of his or her medical record under section 5, the health care provider, health facility, or medical records company to which the request is directed may charge the patient or his or her authorized representative a fee that is not more than the following amounts:

- (a) An initial fee of \$20.00 per request for a copy of the record.
- (b) Paper copies as follows:
 - (i) One dollar per page for the first 20 pages.
 - (ii) Fifty cents per page for pages 21 through 50.
 - (iii) Twenty cents for pages 51 and over.

A 'patient', as defined by this rule, shall not be charged an initial fee [see (1) (a) above] for his or her medical record. (333.26269(5)). However, a patient can be charged the other permitted fees for his or her medical record.

Subsection 6 of Section 9 of Public Act 47 of 2004 (MCL § 333.26269), states the following:

(6) Beginning 2 years after the effective date of this act, the department of community health shall adjust on an annual basis the fees prescribed by subsection (1) by an amount determined by the state treasurer to reflect the cumulative annual percentage change in the Detroit consumer price index.

Pursuant to the above requirements, I, Janet Olszewski, Director of the Michigan Department of Community Health recognize the State Treasurer's certification of the annual percentage increase in the Detroit consumer price index for the 2008 calendar year of 2.3%. The increased maximum charges are as follows:

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President's Message

WOW, what a year! At last year's Annual Meeting in Mackinac, I promised that our theme would be to Honor the Past while Building the Future. I sincerely feel that the volunteers that have worked for you this year have honored that pledge, and here is a summary of their accomplishments.

STRATEGY I: EDUCATION

- Karen Kramer and her very busy team coordinated 7 different educational sessions throughout the state, including a Saturday conference attended by over 80 people.
- Sheila Bowlds and the CDIP group held four CDIP programs and published the results in the Focus. She is also spearheading discussions with MHIMA so we can have a coordinated response to the latest Blue Cross DRG audits that have been very confusing to hospitals.
- Rochelle Cooper and the Convention Arrangements Committee have created a wonderful list of speakers for the annual meeting and have scouted facilities for the 2012 meeting. (2010 will be at the Troy Marriott and 2011 will be at Soaring Eagle.)
- The MyPHR volunteers under the direction of Margaret Neterer have held over 29 programs that have trained over 1200 citizens in this terrific community support program.
- Sheila Bowlds, Marsha Allen and Karen Kramer are working on creating a webinar available to the Michigan members, and potentially to other states.

STRATEGY II: ADVOCACY

- Charlie Robinson and I attended the National Hill Day where we spoke to staffers of Debbie Stabenow, Sander Levin, Candace Miller and Gary Peters about how to best deploy the new funding under ARRA available for computerized and interconnected health information.
- Charlie is also working on a way to create a Michigan Hill Day.

STRATEGY III: MEMBERSHIP

- Tracy Rowland and team have finalized the criteria and application form for the new Mentor Award. The winners of the Yvonne Harbert Student Award and the Scholarship Award will be announced at our Annual Business Meeting on Wednesday May 13.
- We have worked long and hard on adding a variety of items of interest and note to the Web Site, and we are always looking for extra volunteers to assist with updating MHIMA.org.
- Peggy Chapo was successful in creating and publishing six issues of FOCUS with a very special March-April issue devoted to the 80th anniversary of MHIMA. Could you pass that test today?
- Sally Rynberg takes care of our Michigan Community of Practice web site linked to AHIMA.org, updating a Scorecard that is a model that other states try to copy. She also helped us create a more streamlined MHIMA work plan that we now use at all Board Meetings.
- Because of the new round-the-year duties of the AHIMA House of Delegates, I created Walker's Wire, to assist in quick feedback between members and delegates and the Board at large, so we can be educated delegates when we vote on issues throughout the year and at the HOD in the fall. I was delighted to do it, and hope it was useful to you.
- Margaret Neterer chaired our Nominating Committee and came up with an excellent ballot, and you of course, elected our excellent Board for 2009-2010 with an unprecedented 18% of the population voting.
- In addition to your delegates, four members are representing you at the national level. Sally Rynberg is on the task force that will create the Health Data Analyst credential details. Rochelle Cooper is working with the task force in advancing the Communities of Practice (CoP) structure and functions. Charlie Robinson is working on the item writing committee for the RHIT exam. Jan Crocker was on the National Nominating Committee who created the national ballot for this year's June voting.
- Denise Holstege and Peggy Chapo created a survey published in the FOCUS for March-April that asks for your comments about the right educational sessions for your CEs.
- We applied for Component State Association Awards again (remember we won two firsts and one second last year). This year we applied for the Awards of Member Retention and Recognition and Support for Educational Programs. The Support for Educational Programs this year has been given a large push by Carol Jennings' project of Mentoring. Her team has spent more than 40 hours volunteering in a variety of presentations to the students throughout the state. We will learn of the Award recipients in July at Team Talks.
- We are in the process of applying for a Triumph Award for our MyPHR training program. We may have had the largest population of attendees and volunteers in the USA, successfully coordinated by Margaret Neterer.
- We created a new Board of Directors for the Medical Record Charities, and there we work on fund raising and the student awards. This year we raised over \$3,000 for the Charities fund with our Silent Auction and Golf Outing activities. This Board is struggling with the best way to modify our two existing awards, and of course the new award. With successful fund raising activities, how shall we share the wealth; increase the number of awards, increase the amount of each reward, both? We are interested in your feedback.
- The UP regional association is back in business with new leadership and a very energetic membership. We had a great joint board meeting by conference call in January. All of the regional associations have signed formal agreements with MHIMA this year.
- Our finances have dwindled a bit (sound familiar?), but in spite of that, we have been able to reduce the cost of the Annual Meeting Registration.
- Due to changing tax laws, we have hired a less expensive accountant who is in Muskegon, and have already filed the newly designed tax returns for our organization and for the Medical Record Charities, under the watchful eye of Bonnie Jameson our Secretary-Treasurer.

- We have entered into a coordinating relationship with the MHA to assist us in the roll out of the RACs, and also help us work with Blue Cross in their recent DRG audits that have been extremely burdensome to hospitals. MHA met with the Board at the March meeting to discuss strategies for both initiatives.

STRATEGY IV: E-HIM

- Karen Schmidt and Nancy Walker have been active members of the Southeast MI Health Information Exchange, and we have added Linda Creps from Ann Arbor and Kim Roberts from Lansing to the workgroup.
- Sally Rynberg has offered her assistance to the SouthWest Regional HIE.
- Nancy Walker has presented written and verbal testimony to the Michigan HIT Commission in Lansing on numerous occasions. The testimony was shared with the AHIMA through the Physician Practice Community of Practice because it listed the potential of the MHIMA (in coordination with our educational programs) being a source for educational assistance for physician office training.
- E-HIM is a key strategy for our future and with that, Karen Schmidt President-Elect has assigned me to be the Strategy Manager, along with the members listed above, for 2009-2010 E-HIM, to more formally ‘relationship-build’ with the state and the regional stakeholders.

CENTRAL OFFICE COORDINATOR

- None of the above mentioned volunteer activities would be in place without the support of Marsha Allen our Central Office Coordinator. Literally, she is a part of every single topic that the volunteers are involved in. We could NOT function as effectively as we do without her support. Thank you, Marsha, is not enough for all the support she has provided to us!

And to you members, thank you so much for giving me the opportunity to serve you this year. I am humbled and grateful to work with such an energetic and successful group of volunteers (and our Central Office) on your behalf.

HOD Team Creates a Clinical Practice Sites/ Professional Practice Experiences (PPE) Guide

In 2008, the House of Delegates (HOD) organized itself into six teams to focus on different areas of the profession. The six HOD Teams are: Environmental Scanning, Best Practices/Standards, Professional Development and Recognition, Volunteer and Leadership Development, HOD Operations and Health Information Management (HIM) Higher Education and Workforce. The AHIMA Board of Directors sets specific charges for each of the HOD Teams to work on throughout the year.

One of the charges for the HOD Team on HIM Higher Education and Workforce is to provide support and recommendations to increase the number of clinical practice sites and opportunities for students to complete professional practice experiences. To that end, the Team created a Clinical Practice Sites/Professional Practice Experiences (PPE) Guide that provides information and best practices about serving as a clinical practice site and hosting students who are completing their required professional practice experiences. The Guide provides specific, helpful information to: site managers, department mentors, Component State Associations (CSA), academic programs and students. If you are involved with or considering hosting students, take a few minutes to review the helpful information found in the Guide.
